**INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT**

***Opinion***

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Food Security for America, Inc. (the Organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2022, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Food Security for America, Inc. as of June 30, 2022, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

***Basis of Opinion***

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Food Security for America, Inc. and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

***Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements***

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and for the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Food Security for America, Inc.'s ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date that the financial statements are issued.

***Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements***

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and, therefore, is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Founded and incorporated in 2011, Food Security of America, Inc. (the Organization) is a non-profit corporation operating out of facilities in Atlanta, Georgia. The Organization provides food for those in need in a way that affirms dignity and builds community.

**Note A – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

The Organization's Summary of Significant Accounting Policies is presented to assist in understanding its financial statements. These accounting policies conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and have been consistently applied in the statement's preparation. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Organization's management, who are responsible for their integrity and objectivity.

**Basis of Accounting and Presentation** - The Organization maintains its accounting records on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP). The Organization reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets as follows:

Net Assets without Donor Restrictions are not subject to or no longer subject to donor-imposed time and/or purpose restrictions.

Net Assets with Donor Restrictions whose use is limited by donor-imposed time and/or purpose restrictions.

**Cash and Cash Equivalents** - Cash and cash equivalents include all highly liquid investments purchased with an initial maturity of three months or less. As of December 31, 2021 there were no cash equivalents.

**Effect of New Accounting Pronouncements to be Adopted in Future Periods** – In February 2016, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued ASU 2016-02, *Leases (Topic 842)*, which requires a lessee to recognize assets and liabilities on the balance sheet for those leases classified as operating leases under previous guidance. In July 2018, the FASB issued ASU 2018-10, *Codification Improvements to Topic 842 (Leases)*, and ASU 2018-10 *Leases (Topic 842), Targeted Improvements*, which provide (i) narrow amendments to clarify how to apply certain aspects of the new lease standard, (ii) entities with an additional transition method to adopt the new standard. In May 2020, the FASB issued ASU 2020-05 that deferred the effective date of this new standard until annual periods beginning after December 15, 2021. Based on a preliminary assessment, the Organization expects that most of its operating lease commitments will be subject to the new guidance and recognized as operating lease liabilities and right-of-use assets upon adoption, resulting in an increase in the assets and liabilities on the balance sheet. The Organization will be required to adopt these standards in the first quarter of 2022 using a modified retrospective transition approach. The Organization is continuing its evaluation, which may identify additional impacts this standard and its amendments will have on the financial statements and related disclosures.

**Property and Equipment** - Purchased furniture, fixtures and office equipment are carried at cost. Donated furniture, fixtures and office equipment are carried at approximate fair value at the date of donation. Expenditures over \$1,500 for furniture, fixtures and office equipment, with an estimated useful life of more than two years, are capitalized. Expenditures for repairs, maintenance, renewals and betterments that materially prolong an asset's useful life are capitalized. Expenses for repairs and maintenance that don't extend lives are expensed. Depreciation is provided under the straight-line method over each asset's estimated useful life ranging from three to ten years. Depreciation expense for the year ended June 30, 2022, was \$6,702.

**Note A – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)**

**Government Grants and Pledges Receivable** – Government Grants receivable arise from services provided under the terms of the grants. Pledges receivable are recognized when a donor makes a written pledge to the Organization. Management annually evaluates the need for an allowance for uncollectable receivables based upon historical experience and aging of the receivables. As a result of that evaluation, no allowance was considered necessary as of June 30, 2022.

In May 2014, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2014-09, *Revenue from Contracts with Customers* (Topic 606), which is a comprehensive new revenue recognition standard that did supersede existing revenue recognition guidance. The core principle of the guidance is that an entity should recognize revenue to depict the transfer of promised goods and services to customers in an amount that reflects the consideration to which the entity expects to be entitled in exchange for those goods and services. The FASB issued ASU 2015-14 that deferred the effective date for the Organization until annual periods beginning after December 15, 2018. The FASB then issued ASU 2020-05 that deferred the effective date for the Organization until annual periods beginning after June 30, 2020. The Organization's revenue recognition policies meets the core principle requirements of Topic 606. Other aspects of Topic 606 do not apply to the Organization since it does not enter in to contracts with either its donors or benefactors. The implementation had no impact on previously reported net assets.

**Donated Assets, Space and Services** - Donated marketable securities and other noncash donations are recorded as contributions at their estimated fair values at the date of donation. Donated services are recognized as contributions if the services (a) create or enhance nonfinancial assets or (b) require specialized skills, are performed by people with those skills, and would otherwise be purchased by the Organization. During 2022, the Organization recognized \$7,200 in-kind donations of services.

**Contributions** – Unconditional promises to give and contributions received are recorded as increases in net assets without donor restrictions or net asset with donor restrictions depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. When restrictions expire (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. In the absence of donor restrictions to the contrary, restrictions on contributions of property or equipment or on assets restricted to acquiring property or equipment expire when the property or equipment is placed in service.

**Functional Allocation of Expenses** – The costs of providing various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities and in the statement of functional expenses. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited. The financial statements also report certain categories of expenses that are attributed to more than one function requiring allocation on a reasonable basis that is consistently applied. Costs are directly charged to the function they benefit. Personnel costs are allocated based on estimated time spent for each function. Rent and other occupancy costs are allocated based on allocation of square footage.

**Fair Value of Financial Instruments** - The Organization's financial instruments consist of cash, grants and pledges receivable, accrued liabilities and accounts payable. The carrying value of these instruments approximates fair value due to their relatively short-term nature.

**Note A – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)**

**Tax Exempt Status** - The Organization is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Organization qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170(b)(1)(A) and has been classified as an organization other than a private foundation under Section 509(a)(2). Income from certain activities not directly related to the Organization's tax-exempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. For the year ended June 30, 2022, the Organization did not have any unrelated business income and, accordingly, no unrelated business income tax. The Organization believes it has appropriate support for any tax positions taken, and as such, does not have any uncertain tax positions that are material to the financial statements. The Organization's income tax returns are subject to examination by the appropriate regulatory authorities, and as of June 30, 2022, the Organization's federal tax returns remain open to examination for the last three (3) years.

**Use of Estimates** - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions affecting the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities as of the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting year. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

**Note C – Concentrations of Credit and Other Risks**

The Organization maintains its cash at financial institutions insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC). The FDIC-insured limit is \$250,000 of deposits per financial institution. As of June 30, 2022, the Organization's balances did not exceed these insured limits. Management believes that the FDIC backing and the quality of the financial institution with which these amounts are deposited minimizes any potential risk of material loss. The Organization receives a majority of funding through contributions and grants. Future economic conditions or changes in funding could negatively impact the Organization's ability to continue their programs at the current level.

**Note D – Liquidity and Availability of Financial Assets**

The Organization's primary sources of support are grants and pledges. Monthly cash outflows vary each year based on the number of programs operating. The following reflects the Organization's financial assets as of the statement of financial position date, reduced by amounts not available for general use within one year of the statement of financial position date because of contractual or donor-imposed restrictions or internal designations. Amounts available include donor-restricted amounts that are available for expenditure in the following year. Amounts not available include amounts set aside for operating and other reserves that could be drawn upon if the Organization approves the action. The Organization's financial assets as June 30, 2022, available within one year after this date to satisfy liabilities at this date and for future general expenditure totaled \$192,476.

**Note E – Subsequent Events**

Management has evaluated events and transactions which occurred through December 17, 2022, which was the date the financial statements were available to be issued. Management has determined that no other events or transactions are required to be disclosed.
